ELT Candidate Bios

The Executive Leadership Team consists of the bishop plus 12 other persons—six clergy, six laity. Eight of those persons are elected by the National Conference, four of them every two years to four-year terms. The other four are appointed by the new ELT to two-year terms. Report 41 lists all members of the 2021-2023 ELT, and identifies the four persons whose terms continue until 2025.

Maria Alonso-Tomlinson

International UB Church in Allentown, Pa.

Maria Alonso-Tomlinson was born in San Juan, Puerto Ric. She became a Christian there in 1987, and became highly involved in the church. For 18 months she was a missionary in Costa Rica. Maria came to the US in 2000 when she married Rev. Neville Tomlinson, who had founded International UB church in Allentown, Pa., in 1997. They have served there ever since.

Maria has participated in leading worship, preaching, counseling, children's ministry, youth retreats, and more. Jeremiah N. Greenland

Prince Street UB church in Shippensburg, Pa.
